#### Half term message:

Well, what a long half term!! After eight weeks, we have a lot of tired students and staff. This has been a half term when everyone has been adapting to our new daily schedule – an earlier start to the day and an additional lesson, meaning more changeovers.

Thank you to everyone in the Allerton Grange community who has made the transition to the new arrangements so seamless – thank you to:

- Our parents/carers who have ensured that our students arrive on time every morning, in full uniform and ready to learn. Our attendance this half term has been 94.5%, which is 2.5% above the national average.
- Our students who have shown themselves to be so adaptable to change and have already experienced an additional 13 hours of teaching time they would not have received in previous years. It is also remarkable how punctual students have been to lessons lateness to lessons in every week of this half term has been less than half of 1%.
- Our staff community who are having to plan and deliver more lessons; supervise more lesson changeovers and build relationships with more classes and students.

Thank you to you all and I wish everyone a well-deserved rest and recharge over the half term break.

#### Congratulations to our premises team (Mitie):

Our premises team have just undergone their annual health and safety audit from Mitie, the parent company. They scored a brilliant 95% compliance score, putting them at the top of all school premises teams in Leeds. A great achievement and they are currently working on addressing the 5% below par.

#### Punctuality to school:

A reminder to all students and families that lessons begin at 8.30 am every morning, and therefore students must be in school before this time. If they arrive at school for 8.30 am, they will be late and will be issued with a consequence (behaviour point). 
#### **Maths Homework Heroes**

#### Frankenstein Theatre Trip Ms Halaka, Curriculum Leader for English reports:

It was an absolute pleasure to take a group of English Literature students from Years 11, 12, and 13 to see 'Frankenstein' at York Theatre Royal on Thursday 26 October.

The play was a creative reworking of Mary Shelley's classic novel and was a captivating stage show.

Here's what some of our students named as their favourite thing about the play:

**Harry** - how the play explored the value of human intellect and the hell it can create.

Sophie - the lighting and the staging in general.



Shayaan - the portrayal of the monster - the search for himself and how he doesn't feel human.

**Isobel** - the way the monster is never given a name and his struggle with identity and never being able to find peace within himself.

Maya - the dehumanisation of human construction and the motif of vision and light.

James - the theme of isolation and the cyclical structure of loneliness and how isolation is one of the biggest causes of human suffering - the way the monster physically doesn't belong in the world but also how the doctor doesn't fit in with society either.

Sasha - the way they presented Frankenstein as a woman and the way she had to overcompensate as a female scientist in a man's world.

Lily - how the play explores what it means to be human and how humans try to control humanity and play god.

Taslima - that Frankenstein was a woman - the diversity in terms of casting - the lighting and set useful to see the characters embodied on stage ...

Rimsha - ...especially the monster - the way he articulated himself, his physicality.


**Zaahra -** a different take, how she was female and her reaction to the monster she created - I thought they portrayed the doctor as more sensitive - I was disappointed they cut out the De Lacys.

Mohid - I thought it was a good performance - I liked the fact there was a female Frankenstein.

**Grace** - the passionate acting and the lighting and music - it was all very scary but it was a good experience! It made me think about the message of the story and the ethics of what they were trying to do.




