

Celebrating our KLAS curriculum:

The KLAS curriculum is unique to Allerton Grange and represents a student's day to day experience at

K refers to our knowledge rich curriculum where our students are taught the most important powerful knowledge for each of the subjects they study.

L refers to literacy. Our curriculum is word rich. Students are taught a variety of new words and read widely.

A refers to our aspirational enrichment programme. Students have opportunities to take part in many experiences outside the classroom, through clubs, trips, assemblies, visiting speakers and PSHE.

\$ refers to service and leadership. Students develop these skills through the work they do in community projects and careers.

At Allerton Grange, we believe that our KLAS curriculum provides students with the knowledge, the vocabulary, the experiences, and the character, to secure places at world renowned universities and on elite training programmes, enabling them to make aspirational career choices. We regularly receive visits from other schools wanting to see our KLAS curriculum in operation.

This week - A focus on Literacy:

The ability to read and write is fundamental to a child being able to access the full curriculum.

At Allerton Grange, our literacy strategy aims to:

- a) Ensure students have the vocabulary to be able to access our ambitious curriculum and also function in the modern
- b) Ensure students have a love for reading. This supports students in developing a richer vocabulary and improves their writing.
- c) Ensure students can <u>articulate</u> their knowledge with confidence. If a student can speak it, they can write it; if they can write it, they are more likely to remember it.

Our literacy strategy has 3 strands:

1. Teaching vocabulary:

- Students are explicitly taught subject specific vocabulary as part of their curriculum. They are taught and tested on the spelling and the definition of key words.
- Students in Year 7, 8 and 9 are taught and tested on the spelling and understanding of the most common academic vocabulary. Their assessments take place during form time every term.

2. Teaching reading – students at Allerton Grange are expected to read a lot:

- The Curriculum: In every subject, high order texts are woven through the curriculum. Students are empowered to read and deepen their understanding of the knowledge rich curriculum.
- Tutor-led Reading Drop Everything And Read: Form time sessions include dedicated DEAR time, where form tutors read a set novel aloud to the students. Students actively engage, following along with their copies of the book, promoting both enjoyment and comprehension.
- **Reading Fluency lessons**: In Year 7 and 8, students benefit from weekly reading sessions led by their English teacher. These sessions focus on enhancing reading fluency, with an emphasis on poetry recitation. This approach provides students with valuable support and modelling from their teacher, and the opportunity to practise reading aloud.
- Reading Platforms: We've adopted Reading Plus for Year 7 and 8 students, a programme proven to refine reading skills and comprehension through regular practice. As students progress to Year 9, Sparx Reader is introduced. This is a platform designed to sustain and elevate reading skills into Key Stage 4 and beyond. With a selection of eBooks tailored to students' reading level, Sparx Reader encourages regular independent reading which plays a pivotal role in advancing vital literacy skills.

3. Developing oracy:

- This strand is being developed this year, ready for a full roll-out next year.
- The aim is for every student to have the confidence to be able to speak like a specialist scholar. Eg. speaking like a historian or speaking like a scientist.
- Students will also be given more opportunities through the enrichment programme to partake in activities associated with oracy eg. debating society and public speaking competitions. Dates for your Diary:

Thank you to all the performers, technical team and music ambassadors, as well as the fabulous Music Team.






























Christmas Card Competition

Sneaker Freaks Product Pitch Session

In their newly timetabled AGS Futures lessons, Year 10 have kicked off the year with a Sneaker Freaks project.

In September, the project was launched by a Senior Product Manager from New Balance, who briefed the students and presented about his career journey. A local gentleman from Roundhay, Michael has created and brought to market some of Adidas and New Balance's best-selling sports products.

Each session, students have heard from one of Michael's colleagues at New Balance about their role and their involvement in the product creation process. Students then spent the rest of each session designing a product (in this case a sports shoe), an advertising campaign and a product pitch.





This week, the winning groups from each Year 10 form pitched their product to two New Balance representatives.

Both the New Balance representatives and school staff were hugely impressed by the quality of the presentations, the amount of work and research that went into meeting the project brief and the way in which students pitched their idea.

Attendance Matters

At Allerton Grange, our target is for all students to achieve 100% attendance and punctuality. The minimum expectation is for all students to have 97% attendance over the academic year. We appreciate the efforts of parents, carers and families to ensure that students are attending school every day, and on time.

All parents and carers have a legal responsibility to ensure that their child/ren receive a suitable education for their age and aptitude. Research has shown that excellent attendance is key for ensuring positive outcomes for children and young people, and is vital to students being able to learn effectively and take an active part in school life.

As we approach the end of term, please keep in mind that every day at school is important. All students are expected to be in school until their finish time on Friday 22 December 2023.

Below is a reminder of what to do if your child is ill, is going to be late or has an appointment during the school day:

Illness

If your child is ill, you can check the NHS website to help you decide if they are too ill to attend school: https://www.nhs.uk/live-well/is-my-child-too-ill-for-school/ If your child is absent, a parent/carer must contact school using ClassCharts before 8.30 am on each day of absence.

Lateness

If your child is going to be late to school, they need to have a note from their parent or carer explaining the reason why they are late. On arrival, the student must sign in at the Attendance Office and then go straight to their lesson. Persistent lateness will result in detention and/or isolation.

Appointments during the school day

Where possible, please make appointments for your child outside of school hours. If your child has an appointment during school time, this should be recorded on ClassCharts and they must take a note from their parent or carer to their Year Office to receive a green slip. At the time they need to leave school, the student must hand the slip into Main Reception, where they will receive a Police signing out slip. **Students should never leave school without permission.** If you would like to talk to us about your child's attendance, or if you need support, please get in touch.


These clubs start the week beginning 27^{th} November until February half term. ALL CLUBS ARE FROM 3 - 4pm.
