# Important: Changes to Access to the School Site

Following the incident on Wednesday afternoon on the Allerton Grange Park Fields, we have reviewed our site security measures to keep our school community as safe as possible.

From Monday 15 July, the following arrangements will be in place:

#### Morning:

**Talbot Avenue** - The gates will open at 8.10 am and close at 8.40 am. Students arriving late will need to press the Student button at the gate to be let through the gate.

**Lidgett Lane** - The gates will open at 8.15 am and close at 8.25 am. Students arriving late will need to enter school via Talbot Avenue. All cars must leave the turning circle area by 8.25 am.

#### Afternoon:

**Talbot Avenue** - The gates will open at 3.00 pm and close at 3.30 pm.

**Lidgett Lane** - The gates to the turning circle will open at 2.40 pm and will be locked at 3.30 pm. All cars must leave this area by 3.30 pm, when the gates will be locked.

Students staying in school for after school activities will be supervised by staff and taken to the gate to leave safely via Talbot Avenue.

Turnout overall was 52% (not much lower than the real thing) with some interesting variations from 40% in Year 7 to 72% in Year 12.

The results were also interesting and maybe a little glimpse into the near future.

Of the 47 Form Constituencies, The Green Party won the most, with 29, followed by Labour with 16, and Reform with 2.

Again, there were some interesting patterns with the lower years voting more for Labour and then the other years much more toward Green.

There was a really good buzz throughout the day and students were keen to take part and enjoyed the experience.

In a very busy week of events last week, 161 Year 7s had a back-to-basics escape to the forest on the Bushcraft residential!

We were lucky enough to start the trip off with some glorious sun on Monday morning and arrived just in time for lunch cooked over fires the students helped to build themselves! They were tasked with gathering sticks to keep it burning while the Bushcraft staff toasted buns and cooked up some burgers.

Tuesday continued to give us dry weather and students were shown how to administer first aid and then had to put it to the test when their teachers were involved in a shocking – fake – plane crash! In one scenario, 4 of the 6 teachers were successfully carried to safety: not a bad result!

They were then shown how to fillet and cook a whole salmon. Whilst this part was fascinating and the end result delicious, there was a bonus Bushtucker Trial challenge that was offered to all students: eat one of the salmon's eyes. Our students are a brave bunch and there were plenty of volunteers to choose from. The lucky (?!) few embraced the challenge head-on and all eyes were successfully consumed! The evening was spent with all three camps coming together to participate in "Tribe's Got Talent" where students demonstrated their scope of epic talents including singing, dancing, gymnastics, joke-telling and play writing and performing.

We did unfortunately wake up to rain on Wednesday morning but this didn't dampen the spirits of the students: they rallied to get everything packed away ready for the lunchtime departure before applying all the skills they'd learnt to a survival scenario. Some of our budding architects built some very impressive shelters and the teachers benefitted from their fire-building skills.

# **Lost Property**


There is a large amount of lost property at Main Reception including coats, PE tops, trainers and water bottles.
