# Dropping off and collecting students at the end of the day

If you are dropping off or collecting children by car at the beginning and end of the day, please be considerate to pedestrians and other road users.

The Talbot Avenue entrance is a pedestrian entrance for students and is very busy before and after school.

We are concerned that there will be a serious accident, due to dangerous driving and parking, and ask parents and carers to be more careful.

Please do not stop outside school on Talbot Avenue to drop off or pick up children. This poses a risk to both drivers and pedestrians.

The Turning Circle, accessible from Lidgett Lane, is there for parents and carers to drop off and pick up children.

Alternatively, you can arrange to collect children from nearby streets.

Students will be reminded in school about road safety, and the importance of checking for traffic before crossing a road. Please talk to your children about road safety, particularly if they are walking to school by themselves for the first time.

The safety of our students is our priority, and we must ensure they are able to always enter and exit the school site safely.

#### Access to the School Site

#### Morning:

**Talbot Avenue** - The gates open at 8.10 am and close at 8.40 am. Students arriving late will need to press the Student button at the gate to be let through to the Student Entrance/ Attendance Office.

**Lidgett Lane** - The gates will open at 8.15 am and close at 8.25 am. Students arriving late will need to enter school via Talbot Avenue. All cars must leave the Turning Circle area by 8.25 am.

#### Afternoon:

**Talbot Avenue** - The gates open at 3.00 pm and close at 3.30 pm.

**Lidgett Lane** - The gates to the Turning Circle open at 2.40 pm and will be locked at 3.30 pm. All cars must leave this area by 3.30 pm, when the gates will be locked.

Students staying in school for after school activities will be supervised by staff and taken to the gate to leave safely via Talbot Avenue.

# EPQ Presentations by Ms Ryding, EPQ Coordinator

On Monday, the 25 Year 13 EPQ students participated in the final examined component of their EPQ journey: the presentation event.



This is an academically invigorating event that showcases the best of our students: the exuberance, eloquence and excellence with which our students conducted themselves was truly inspiring.

The Extended Project Qualification (or EPQ) is an optional, additional yearlong research project offered to A-Level students which provides them with total autonomy over their studies. It places the students at the centre of the expertise.

The following are just a handful of the titles presented:

- Biology or Psychology which factor affords elite combat athletes the most competitive advantage?
- To what extent did the Somali oral tradition evolve during the Somali civil war?
- How do Aristophanes' plays reflect social attitudes to slavery in Classical Athens?
- To what extent have attitudes surrounding 'female hysteria' and 'mad' women developed from its origins in Ancient Greece to the modern day and how have these changing perceptions been shown in media?
- Which is the most effective therapy for children with autism?
- A case study in the preservation and conservation of older technology deemed obsolete in a modern context.

#### **Drama Workshop**

This week, our GCSE and A Level Drama students benefitted from a specialist practitioner workshop from theatre maker Dave Cartwright.

Students developed their understanding of Brecht and learned how to apply his methodologies practically. We were super impressed with the creativity and collaboration from all our students and the thought provoking work they created.










# Don't start your day by being late to school! Students need to be in school, in their form room, at 8.25 am ready for the register to be taken at 8.30 am.
